Community Updates

It's Maple Syrup time and it kicked off with the tree tapping ceremony at Matthews Maple Syrup. This year I was joined by Mayor Al McDonald of the City of North Bay, Mayor Pat Haufe of Nipissing Township and MPP Vic Fedeli. From now until the Maple Syrup Festival, April 28th, you can enjoy a pancake breakfast every Saturday morning at the Powassan United Church or Sunday morning at the Glendale Community Center, hosted by the Powassan Lions Club.

Last month I was asked to meet with the Trout Creek Seniors to discuss the changes to the Ontario Building Code. Approximately seventy people took the time to join me. I was able to discuss and answer questions on how this will affect the residents of Trout Creek when recommended changes are implemented by the North Bay Mattawa Conservation Authority and the Source Water Protection Committee. The proposed changes will have a profound impact on the community of Trout Creek, restricting development and future growth and opportunity. The Council of the Municipality of Powassan is committed to removing Trout Creek from the Source Water Protection Policy. We have already met with the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Honorable Kathleen Wynne to discuss our concerns. We have a meeting set with the North Bay Mattawa Conservation Authority. Our next step will be to request a meeting with the Minister of the Environment.

With spring upon us, it's always great to see so many people getting out and about to check out what our riding has to offer. When Patty and I heard of a pheasant farm in Commanda, I thought it would be something like the quail farm in Nipissing Township - growing the birds for food production. Imagine our surprise when we met Tony and Diane Matthys! Their pheasant aviary, filled with exotic birds from around the world, is remarkable. Most of the birds are extremely rare and many are endangered species. Forest destruction, hunting, and increased population are all putting pressure on their predominantly Asian habitat, so the Matthys' became private breeders. They have about 200 birds and two dozen species. The birds breed and hatch around 50 to 60 new additions every year. Tony sells or exchanges the birds with private breeders and exotic zoos across North America. This 'expanded hobby' has not only been personally rewarding to Tony and Diane, it has helped to protect rare treasures from around the world. It was a real treat to find this hidden jewel right in our own backyard. ~Vic

What Is Autism?

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a complex neurobiological condition that can affect the normal function of the gastrointestinal, immune, hepatic, endocrine and nervous systems. It impacts normal brain development leaving most individuals with communication problems, difficulty with typical social interactions and a tendency to repeat specific patterns of behaviour. There is also a markedly restricted repertoire of activity and interests. Individuals on the autism spectrum tend to have varying degrees and combinations of symptoms and therefore treatment needs to be specific

to the individual. Strengths Exhibited by Individuals with Autism Although some areas of development in a child with autism are delayed, children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) often exhibit skills beyond their years in other areas. These intellectual strengths may overshadow the developmental problems experienced by your child. These strengths may include one or more of the following:

- Non-verbal reasoning skills
- ·Reading skills
- Perceptual motor skills

- Drawing skills

- Computer interest and skills
- Exceptional memory
- Visual Spatial abilities Music skills

Weaknesses Exhibited by Individuals with Autism The above exceptional skills may be combined with subtle or significant delays in other areas of development. All individuals with the diagnosis demonstrate some of the following:

- Impairment in Social relationships
- ·Deficits in communication/language
- Perseveration on interests and activities
- •Dependence on routine ·Gastrointestinal problems
- Abnormal responses to sensory stimulation
- Behaviour problems
- ·Variability of intellectual functioning
- •Uneven development profile
- •Difficulties in sleeping, toileting and eating
 - Immune irregularities Nutritional deficiencies

The primary symptoms of autism include problems with communication and social interaction as well as repetitive interests and activities. (for more information please see www.autismcanada.org)

Is There a Limit to Innovation?

In the past several centuries we have witnessed an impressive array of culture changing technologies being invented to solve problems: the automobile, printing press, and now the Internet. It is easy to accept that these inventions have had profound effects on the course of civilization.

Today the world is facing seemingly unsolvable problems that undermine our expectations of the future: Global economic problems, increasingly scarce fuel and water resources, world hunger and over population to name a few. Many believe that the way forward is through more innovation so that we may discover the next technology that helps us overcome these challenges.

Is it realistic to believe that western ingenuity can provide a limitless source of growth and problem solving ability that somehow makes the limits of available resources seem meaningless? There is a certain stock of easily solvable questions and as humans beings we tend to do the easiest things first. In the process of the evolving complexity of society, we innovate our way out of a problem and the amount of money and resources needed to solve the next one increases.

To illustrate, during the 18th century, a well educated person could make a major medical breakthrough in his living room using a microscope he built himself. Today, answering questions about the universe requires specialist PHDs using International space stations and large hadron colliers. The costs of each new innovation increase in terms of training, complexity, materials, and energy needed.

Privately funded innovation requires unpopular intellectual patent protections and the prospect for profits or it will not be done. Governments try to assist through subsidies, which adds to the already out of control debt problem. Who will pay the costs of solving the next crisis?

The limit to innovation is our unwillingness to pay these increasing costs of innovation. At some point in the future, we may decide it is more desirable to accept our problems and our limitations and adapt to them rather than continue to pay for technical solutions.

HISTORY FROM...

OUR BACK ROADS...

The Railway Reaches Powassan!! While researching a future article on the Grand Trunk Railroad (GTR) I came across an interesting publication. A series of articles documented the construction of the Northern and Pacific Junction Railway from Gravenhurst to what was soon to be known as Nipissing Junction, just outside of modern day Callander. In these reports I found a story that I had never heard before, a story of a woman who helped bring the railway to Powassan.


We start this tale back in 1854 on the coast of the Black Sea, in what is now a part of the Ukraine. A wealthy Russian industrialist Vyacheslav Issak Yad and his wife Yaroslava were imprisoned as Anglo-French troops stormed the Crimean Peninsula, near the port of Sevastopol. The Crimean War is noted for being the first time that railways and telegraphs were used to support the troops. The only daughter of Vyacheslav, Lirpa Sloof Yad managed to escape capture by fleeing north, hiding on one of the supply trains and making her way to Germany. Having been lucky enough to escape with a sizable quantity of gold coins, she was able to make passage to England where she boarded the ship "New World" in Liverpool for the crossing to New York City, arriving March 19 1855.


Upon arrival to her new homeland she befriended a fellow Russian immigrant and soon took up a job as a nanny in Syracuse, New York State. It was here with the help of her employer that she learned the English language while helping with her employers children. She remained here until 1870 when a friend of her boss convinced her to move to Barrie Ontario, then just a small town. The railway had just been completed this far north, on its push into Northern Ontario's wilderness. At this time Lipra started working for The Toronto, Simcoe and Muskoka Junction Railway Co. as a cook. In 1875 the rails reached Gravenhurst and the name was changed to the Northern Railway and Lirpa was now working with the men clearing the line for the tracks.

It wasn't until I moved back to Powassan and heard the name of a local band "The Swamp Donkeys" that I learned this was another name for a moose. When captured at a very young age, a moose can be trained and hitched like a team of horses. The one advantage to a team of moose over horses is their shear strength and long legs they are very adapted for working in the thick bush and swamps of Northern Ontario. Lirpa purchased a team of moose from a local lumberman with the last of her father's fortune, and was soon working clearing the rail lines.

It was very tough work, as the work crews worked year round pushing the rails of steel northward. The days were long, the accommodations primitive, but the pay, and prospect of a substantial bonus upon driving the rails to Lake Nipissing were a major incentive. What lead me to the story of Lirpa Yad was trying to find out about the construction of the railway between South River and Powassan. I had heard a rumour (believed to be true) of a steam locomotive flipping off of a bridge in the huge swamp just south of Trout Creek. I ventured in there last year and you can still see the stone abutments of a bridge at the end of the partially competed rail bed. Apparently workmen had sunk piers 80 feet into the mud, but they still would not hold the weight of the train. The train sank and is believed to be buried in the muck.

Can you work out who's snail finished where, its number and the colour it was painted?



An interesting piece of Trivia: Morris Michtom originally came from Russia; maybe he was fond of bears, animals that figure so strongly in Russian folk tales. He saw the cartoon in the Washington Star, November 18th 1902. He and his wife where in the toy business. His wife made up the first sample bear cub. They made three more, sending one to President Roosevelt asking if he would object to them calling the bear cub 'Teddy Bear'. The President didn't object as the cubs where put on the market early 1903. The first customer was Butler Bros. In 1904 Sears Roebuck was added and between the two of them the took the entire Morris Michtom's output. Thereafter the business expanded and became The Ideal Toy Corporation in 1907. Despite his business acumen, Morris Michtom failed to do two important things: to take out a patent for his jointed Teddy Bear and to register a trademark. As a result many other manufacturers soon followed his lead and made similar Teddy Bears.

Amateur Radio is alive in North Bay!!

One in approximately every 600 of your neighbours has passed Canadian government examinations giving them the authority to use radio equipment for self education, and service to the community. Amateurs are also known as Hams; some are elderly, middle-aged, just entering high school, blind or quadriplegic. There is no age limit to becoming a licensed Amateur Radio Operator.

The service Amateurs provides is unending and often unsung. Most of the time the radios are used for enjoyment and to talk to other amateurs across Canada and around the world. After talking with each other, Hams often exchange QSL cards (post-cards with the operator's call sign, address etc.) as confirmation of the contact. Canadian Amateurs have provided essential communications for: forest fires in B.C.; the devastating tornado in Barrie, Ontario, the San Francisco earthquake; the Mississauga, Ontario train derailment. Amateurs often help military personnel on active duty to communicate with their families. Every day, somewhere, Amateurs help neighbours by passing messages, or calling a service station for a motorist in trouble by using car radio equipment. Recently, one Amateur called up a search and rescue helicopter to lift an injured youngster from a cliff top.

Many Ham Shacks are uniquely decorated with QSL cards from around the world. Hams relay messages from one to another, until the destination is reached - essential practice for time of disaster. When tornadoes struck Barrie, the local Amateurs were on the scene without waiting to be called. They went straight to the disaster area, risking their lives, not knowing if another tornado would strike. Power was provided by Amateur emergency generators and thousands of messages were passed on to the Red Cross, municipalities, police and fire departments and relatives desperate for news.

Groups of Amateurs build satellites to relay amateur communications worldwide. These are mostly multinational efforts, with Canadian, American, British, German, Japanese and Russian Amateurs. Contributing, for amateur radio knows no boundaries. Amateurs often connect computers to radio transceivers (packet radio); others send television pictures around the world and bounce signals off the moon. One may find a Ham sitting beside his/her equipment, at home or in the car, talking to an Amateur perhaps a few thousand miles away. An Amateur's home is often identified by a tall tower with antenna(s) and the car often displays a license plate with a personal call sign such as VA3RAC, each province having a different number.

Amateur radio also has a friendly, social side. Many towns have an Amateur Radio Club where folks gather to talk, hear lectures on aspects of Amateur Radio, and plan emergency exercises and Field Day - a yearly event combining a good time and a test of emergency communication. Clubs sponsor classes for aspiring Amateurs and those who wish to upgrade their operators' certificates. Clubs organize and provide assistance to local groups planning marathons, street parades, patrol the town at Halloween, and demonstrate Amateur Radio in schools and shopping malls.

The North Bay Amateur Radio Club (NBARC) is a non-profit organization whose objective is to further the interests of Amateur Radio, provide communications for local organizations, and when requested to provide emergency communication. As well, it provides a place for amateurs and non-amateurs to get together to discuss the common topic.....radio. Meetings: The club has a business meeting the second Wednesday of every month (except July and August) at the old fire hall on base at 1930L. These are very informal meetings. After the business portion, where club matters are decided upon, there is usually a presentation of interest to the members after which a 50/50 draw takes place. This gives the members a chance to meet face to face rather than talking to one another "on the air". The December meeting is a Christmas Dinner meeting held at one of the local restaurants. Daily coffee meetings are a very popular activity with club members. Monday to Friday meetings are held at the North Bay Mall on Lakeshore Drive at 10 AM and the Saturday coffee is held at the North Gate Square on Highway 11, again at 10 am. Not much business is accomplished at these meetings but many an opinion is expressed on a wide variety of subjects. Everyone, (amateur and non-amateur alike) is welcome to these meetings. Cranberry Pecan Muffins

Prep Time: 15 Min Cook Time: 20 Min Servings: 16

| Ingredients:

11/2 cup butter or margarine, softened

I1 cup sugar

12 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 cup sour cream

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh or frozen cranberries

1/2 cup chopped pecans

| Topping:

12 tablespoons sugar

11/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg

| Directions:

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla. Fold in sour cream. Combine the flour, baking powder, baking soda, nutmeg and salt; stir into creamed mixture just until moistened. Fold in cranberries and pecans. Fill greased or paper-lined muffin cups two-thirds full. Combine topping ingredients; sprinkle over batter. Bake at 400 degrees F for 20-25 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool for 5 minutes before removing from pans to wire racks.
