The Spunky Old Broad @ Newsletter - ETHICS

A key element that many businesses are now putting in the forefront is something called ethics. Although I was raised in an era of ethics and integrity, they've gotten lost in the last few years. Now they are making a comeback and I'd like to ask you where you stand on the subject.

Before you get upset at me for thinking you might not be completely honest in all your business dealings, you have to think about a few things. If you overcharged a customer by mistake and he didn't catch it, would you call him and tell him about it? If you knew a competitor might do a better job for a customer and charge them even less that you could, would you tell her about it? If you caught a team member fudging some numbers to make something more salable, would you report that person?

I know your immediate reaction is to say of course, but when it actually happens, what do you do? In my mind, there is absolutely no justification for not being honest. Do you say something when it is hurtful or spiteful—of course not. But there are many instances where we can get away with something and no one would be the wiser, except for us.

And in my mind that is where ethics starts and stops. We must lead the way for everyone else in our organization. We represent our company and people look to us for role behavior and a person to model themselves after. Remember the expression, "walk your talk." This is where it is the most important.

Ethics state who you are. It determines what you do and how you do it. It broadcasts to the world what you stand for. I know there are many hard and difficult choices that you have to make on a daily basis, but if your decisions are based on what is fair to all people involved, ethics will usually be served.

Sometimes there is not one clear answer. And of course, there are always two sides to every story. This is where your mission and vision statement become important. No, you don't have to make them complicated, and no, people don't want them on your web site necessarily, but they do serve to put people on notice as to your beliefs and purpose. If you use them to guide your ethics, everything should be in perspective.

Community Updates

POWASSAN Peter McIsaac, Mayor - pmcisaac@powassan.net

We have a busy month ahead of us in the Municipality of Powassan. First off we are travelling to Ottawa for the annual Association of Municipalities Ontario (AMO). This year we were able to attain delegations with Ministers. Minister Bartolucci, Northern Development Mines and Forestry - Minister Bradley, Environment and Minister Milloy, Community and Social Services. We are hoping to be awarded funding which would assist with the installation of an elevator in the Sportsplex in order to make the hall more accessible to members of the public. This funding will also benefit The Trout Creek Community Center which requires fire separation from the lobby to the hall as well as other upgrades. We will also be applying for funds in order to complete some much needed repairs to the Lions Park and Public Pool.

We had an issue with lightning strikes on our municipal water service in early July. First the communications tower was hit by lightning causing staff to manually monitor reservoir levels. Then, three days later, lightning damaged the hydro transformer on Fairview that powers the pumps for the municipal water service. We immediately asked residents to conserve water. Thanks to the work of Hydro One the transformer was replaced immediately and the municipal water system was safely running again.

August 24th to 26th is the Trout Creek Fall Fair. There is lots to do, starting Friday night with karaoke. Enjoy the WHAO Horse Show, MNR Canine Unit, Craft Show and a live performance by Cats n' Jammers. Saturday Night's Spaghetti Dinner begins at 5:30. On Sunday morning breakfast will be served starting at 8:30.

The 7th annual Windsong Festival WILL BE HELD August 24th and 25th. This festival gives music fans a chance to get up close and personal with their favourite Canadian artists. With only 200 tickets being sold this music festival ensures that everyone experiences great music in an intimate venue. The festival grounds are located at 509 Memorial Park Drive, Powassan. Everyone is encouraged to bring chairs, blankets, as well as their own food and refreshments. Arrangements for camping at the festival can be made. This year's line-up includes Brock Zeman, Hawksley Workman, Ruth Moody, Doug Paisley and Anne Lindsay.

The Powassan Fall Fair and Rodeo kicks off Friday August 31st with the annual parade. This year, the parade will be starting at Eastholme at 7:00 pm, making its way to the Powassan Fair Grounds. Friday night is the Smash Up derby which is always a hit with the crowd. Later on the Swamp Donkeys will take the stage. Saturday is a busy day with the agricultural displays, horse pulls, rodeo events, truck and tractor pulls. There will be live entertainment by Johnny Williams and Pam Miller. Sunday features a Cowboy Breakfast, then rodeo events and more live music all day.

Beginning May 1, 2013, the Township of Nipissing will join a growing number of communities in Ontario and across Canada as we implement a Clear Garbage Bag program. This change, along with the new Electronics Collection Bins, are expected to help extend the life of our landfills and help to protect our environment. Most municipalities using a clear bag system are reporting 15 to 30% waste diversion findings.

One of the first reactions when people hear about a clear bag system is the perceived invasion of privacy that will occur. Our program will allow for one small, white kitchen size privacy bag per clear bag of waste. As we are a depot program, rather than a curbside collection program, each person is in possession of their bag until it is deposited in our landfills. Once the bag is placed in the landfill, it is in an area that is supervised by our Landfill Attendant and will be compacted on a regular basis. One of the most important things you can do to ensure your privacy is protected is to shred all personal paper items such as correspondence or discarded mail. Using clear, blue or green see through bags will allow us to ensure that recyclables and hazardous waste are not entering our landfills. Extending the life of the landfill will have considerable cost savings as we move forward as well as helping our natural environment to remain beautiful and pristine. We will be providing more information on suggestions and solutions for common concerns during this transition on our website. 

They have such a terrific facility on Highway 534 and such a unique variety of products there. However, you should know they're not the only apiary in our area. I recently had a very interesting visit to Calvin Township and the home of Donna and Leonard Spinks. They not only happen to be the mother and father-in-law of local radio host Dean Belanger, but they also operate an apiary with their partner, Dave Douglass. I donned the protective gear and got a first-hand look at some of the 400,000 bees they have on premises. They produce about 500 pounds of home-grown honey every year. We're so fortunate to have such quality products being made right here in Nipissing in our own backyard. It's my hope you'll get out soon to see what the "buzz" is all about! 8 colonies = 500 lbs. of honey annually. VERY exciting!

The HISTORY FROM. OUR BACK ROADS...

Barkerton or Little Bend?

This is my nineteenth write up in the BackRoads and I believe I have made it once around the area. Having so many great topics to choose from, I have not been ignoring Trout Creek, it has been on my list to do.

Around the time the railway arrived in 1886 a small settlement named Melbourne had been started. We assume that this name was from one of the early settlers, and there still is a street named Melbourne Street today. When the post office opened in 1887 the tiny community was officially named Barkerton. The first postmaster was Neil McEachern and in 1888 Michael Corkery took over the position.

In 1890 the town and post office was renamed Trout Creek, a fitting name for the trout filled stream that flowed through the community. Apparently another name considered was Little Bend, but it was turned down as it sounded inferior to the town of Powassan at the Big Bend of the South River.

Like most communities in our area, its beginning goes back to lumbering. One of the first lumber operations in the area was conducted by the Fraser brothers, who cut and drove timbers down the South River, destined for J.R. Booth's mills. The earliest saw mill I could locate was the one started by William Carr around 1884. The mill was located just west of the modern day town, where a good size waterfall provided power to operate the machinery. A large fire swept through the area in 1892 destroying many trees and Carr's sawmill. The property was taken over by the Trussler Brothers and they realized that the huge charred timbers were still suitable to be sawed into timbers. A stone dam was built on the Trout Creek and a water turbine provided the power to run the machinery.

It is always interesting to see how the area grew, with some communities starting, only to be abandoned for another. One of the first inhabited places was the Barrett Settlement. The Barrett Road was cut from the Nipissing Rosseau Road, near Commanda heading east. James Barrett and his son Richard settled the area in 1880, just to the west of the South River. Soon other farmers settled in this area and a log church was built in 1883. A cemetery was started, and the only remnant of it today is a big pile of stones brought by local farmers for a proposed new church. A cross was erected in 1967 to mark the location of St. Mary's Cemetery. The early graves had been marked by wooden crosses which have long since vanished.

At one time the railway was to run through this settlement, but when the line was built to the east in 1886 the community shifted to what would become Trout Creek. Eventually the post office was closed at the Barrett Settlement, as well as the church. It is said that even some of the people from the cemetery were relocated to the one in Trout Creek.

As the community grew in the late 1900's, Trout Creek had three hotels; the Queens, the Peterborough and the Carr House. There was a butcher shop, watch maker, blacksmith as well as other stores. Gilbert Trussler purchased the Sexsmith Store and renamed it the Trussler Bros. General Store. With the Trussler Mill employing many men the store served a large area. Everything from clothing to furniture, food to farm feed and even coffins could be ordered through there.


These company stores even served as a bank and credit union, extending credit to the workers in the off season. They also acted as a wholesaler, supplying goods to other stores in Commanda, Loring and Golden Valley. In 1905 Harry Pedder was hired as the manager and it became the most reputable business in the area. Mr Pedder stayed on as store manager until 1912 when he retired. The business was sold to Bill Mogridge and he ran it into the late 1940's. The building burned to the ground around that time.

Many other names have been a part of lumbering in the Trout Creek area. Frederick Baechler Sr had started the Trout Creek Lumber Company in 1896, and the Dominion Wood Company had a logging railway that ran from Trout Creek into Algonquin Park. It is hard to sum up history on our early towns, so I may have to come back to the Trout Creek area in another article.





Dealing with Shaky Knees

Many new speakers describe themselves as having shaky knees, butterflies in the tummy, cold sweats, sweaty palms, numbness and nausea. Yet, as listeners, we may only see their hands clutching the lectern. Most frequently, speakers perform much better than they believe they do!

Here are some tips on how to settle those shaky knees:

Speak about a topic you know well, believe in and are passionate about. If you speak on a topic you are not comfortable with, there will be a tendency to memorize or read the speech in case the mind goes blank. If we choose a topic we know well and love, the words will just flow out of us...perhaps not as organized as we would like but we will not freeze.

Write the way you speak. As you write your speech, you adopt different personae. Speeches become creative and flowery, with words that are not normally used. All these changes make the speech more difficult to retain in the memory banks. Try to stay close to your everyday language and manner of speaking. Practice. Start off by reading and re-reading your speech. Where will you put pauses? Where can you jazz it up with gestures? On your speech, make notes where you will pause and what gesture you will incorporate. Now get on your feet and read your speech out loud and incorporate the pauses and gestures. Do this exercise until they feel natural. Next, try to give your speech with notes available but totally dependant on them. Your biggest practice is out lout in front of a live audience, family members, friends, even the family pet.

Find friendly faces in the audience. Perhaps friends will be attending the function where you have been asked to speak. Ask them to be a smiling presence and ask them to sit towards the back of the room so that they can let you know if you have good volume (finger up suggesting you need to increase your volume/ projection). If you are on stage, make contact with others about the room, speaking momentarily to them. The people around them will also feel as if they are getting your attention.

Gingered Beef with Peppers

This fast and easy stir-fry dish has plenty of colour and flavour. Serve with rice.

Cooking Time: 10 min Prep Time: 15 min

Servings: 6 to 8

Ingredients:

1-1/4 lb (625 g) Ontario Beef Top Sirloin stir-fry strips

2 tsp (10 mL) grated gingerroot

11/2 tsp (2 mL) minced garlic 11 each Ontario Greenhouse Red and Green Sweet Pepper, cut in thin strips

¹2 Ontario Cooking Onions, cut in thin strips

4 oz (125 g) Ontario Mushrooms, sliced

1-1/3 cups (325 mL) beef stock

3 tbsp (45 mL) Sodium-reduced soy sauce

3 tbsp (45 mL) cornstarch 1/4 cup (50 mL) water

Preparation:

Spray wok or large skillet with nonstick cooking spray; heat I wok. Stir-fry beef, ginger and garlic over medium-high heat I for 3 minutes or until browned.

Add sweet peppers, onions and mushrooms; stir-fry until I tender-crisp. Add beef stock and soy sauce; bring to sim-I mer. Cover and steam for 1 minute.

I Combine water with cornstarch; stir into wok and simmer, I stirring, for about 1 minute or until thickened.

Mushroom and Shrimp Pasta

Prep Time: 15 min Cooking Time: 8 min Svgs: 4 - 6 Ingredients:

4 cups (1 L) farfalle or rigatoni pasta

1 tbsp (15 mL) vegetable oil

1 lb (500 g) mixed Ontario Mushrooms, sliced (crimini,

3 cloves garlic, minced shiitake and/or white button)

1 tsp (5 mL) each of dried thyme leaves and salt

3 tbsp (45 mL) all-purpose flour

1 1/2 cup (125 mL) sodium-reduced chicken stock

1 large Ontario onion, finely chopped 1/4 tsp (1 mL) pepper

2 cups (500 mL) 2% milk

1 lb (500 g) large frozen shrimp, thawed peeled and deveined 1 1/2 cup (125 mL) freshly grated Parmiagiano-Reggiano cheese, divided

2 tbsp (25 mL) finely chopped fresh Italian parsley 12 tsp (10 mL) hot pepper sauce or to taste

I Preparation: In large pot of boiling salted water, cook pasta according to package directions; drain and set aside. In I same pot, heat oil over medium-high heat; cook mushrooms, garlic, onion, thyme leaves, salt and pepper; stirring oc-I casionally, for about 5 minutes or until mushrooms have browned.

Whisk flour into milk and gradually stir into pot along with chicken stock; bring to simmer. Add shrimp; cook for 2 minutes. Stir in drained pasta, 1/3 cup (75 mL) of the cheese and hot pepper sauce; cook, stirring gently, until thickened and shrimp are cooked. Taste and adjust seasonings with more hot pepper sauce, salt and pepper if desired. Stir in parsley; sprinkle with remaining cheese.

Chicken, Peach and Snow Pea Stir-Fry

Prep Time: 20 Min Cooking Time: 10 – 15 Min

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

1/4 cup (50 mL) cornstarch 1 tbsp (15 mL) teriyaki sauce

1 clove Ontario Garlic, minced

1 2 chicken breasts (about 1 lb/500 g), skinned, boned I and cut into strips

11 can (10 oz/284 mL) chicken broth

1/3 cup (75 mL) teriyaki sauce

13 tbsp (50 mL) vegetable oil

11 tbsp (15 mL) minced fresh gingerroot

I 1 medium Ontario Onion, cut in chunks and separated

14 oz (125 g) Ontario Snow Peas, halved lengthwise

4 medium Ontario Peaches, peeled, pitted and sliced

Toasted sliced almonds

Hot cooked rice or Oriental noodles

Preparation:

I In medium bowl, combine 1 tbsp (15 mL) of the corn-1 starch, 1 tbsp (15 mL) teriyaki sauce, garlic and chicken; Let stand 15 minutes. Meanwhile, combine remaining I cornstarch, chicken broth and 1/3 cup (75 mL) teriyaki I sauce; set aside. Heat 2 tbsp (25 mL) of the oil in hot I wok or large skillet over high heat; stir-fry chicken 3 I minutes; remove. Heat remaining oil in same pan; stir-I fry gingerroot and onion 3 minutes. Add snow peas and I stir-fry 3 minutes. Add chicken, teriyaki sauce mixture and peaches to pan. Cook, stirring, until sauce boils and thickens and peaches are heated through. Garnish with sliced almonds. Serve with hot cooked rice or noodles.


